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

# THE STORY SO FAR...

"Main radio silence" is the order given when something is to be kept quite about. To use the old wartime vernacular we might say "Hush, Hush" or "under wraps"! Since our last Gazette and Christmastime Catalogue were published quite a while back, you may have wondered what has been happening over at Grays of Westminster. You might have speculated that we are up to something. Well indeed we are! But more of that later...

When you review the developments in the Nikon world in that period, you would not accuse that famous manufacturer of offering as it does so many of the great features of the flagship F5 at two thirds the price and weight. The dream camera for the Nikon enthusiast amateur or professional about describes it and well priced by the standard of most dreams at under £1000.00.

Few could resist teaming it up with the simultaneously launched AF 28-105mm f/3.5-4.5D Zoom-Nikkor lens which built so effectively on the technical advances successfully tried and tested in the AF 28-70mm f/3.5-4.5D and AF 24-

anything like slackening the pace of development of the range of their products. Hectic as usual would about describe it.

The F100 was very well received

120mm f/3.5-5.6D Zooms. Offering half-life size macro to a generalpurpose zoom brought a "standard" zoom of unparalleled versatility, and as it turned out popularity. Coupled with the AF 70-300mm f/4-5.6D ED Zoom this gave a two-lens set up that many customers judged perfect for their needs.

In that period two entirely different camera vied for the greatest number of awards. Certainly the F100 won plenty but the Coolpix 950 digital camera kept up enthusiastically. Based on a fixed lens design offering picture angles the same as a 35-105mm zoom on a 35mm film camera, it introduced many to the possibilities of seeing their chosen image on its built in monitor screen, on a tv or computer screen, or printed out on plain paper or better still special (quite expensive) glossy paper. Intriguing stuff!

Whilst 3 clever screw-on ancillary lenses increased the cameras capabilities by allowing wider angle, telephoto and fisheye shots, a big question remained unanswered - will the digital revolution deny us the chance to use our favourite Nikkor to produce a digital image? How can we retain the freedom to choose from (currently) xx lenses but record the image created by these legendary optics digitally.

Nikon answered that question emphatically and dramatically with the D1 digital SLR camera. Now the choice was up to the photographer: the carefully composed image captured with super fidelity by the Nikkor lens could be recorded on film or light sensitive electronic sensors.

It became abundantly clear that photography has changed less *cont...* 



than expected. The communication was what the photographer decided it would be. Merely the means of conveying it could be altered.

Just as telegram and telex messages giving way to faxes and e-mails didn't change the communication, so it is with image recording. A picture is still a great picture and it is recorded by a photographer- this means you!

For many the staggering details available using today's truly

wonderful; film is paramount. For them the teaming up with Kodak by Grays to let you try 5 rolls of Professional print or slide film free when you purchase a camera from us will be of great appeal representing a it as does £30 worth of extra value. Digital appeals for its instantaneousness in image production (For the press who believes the newest information is the most important!) Important as always, the choice is yours and lots of fun - which image to capture, which Nikkor to capture it with,






Nick mentioned that we have been working on something for some time

The Nuvis S is a beautifully made. A shell-type stainless steel design conceals most camera features when closed. Slide open the protective cover and you a host of useful features: Whisper-quiet zooming operation. High-performance 3x zoom with small f-number of f/5.3-7.5. sophisticated autofocus performance. Close-range Correction (CRC) system to minimise picture deterioration. Slow Sync and red-eye reduction capability, a useful built-in dioptre adjustment and a remote Nikkor which is yet to be released! On the subject of books I have some news of a forthcoming release. The long awaited English translation of Peter Braczko's best selling guide to the Nikon system will be published year: The later this Nikon Handbook - A Complete Guide to Cameras, Lenses & Accessories. This handbook provides an overview of the entire Nikon system. All camera models and lenses ever made are listed. The author has developed a coding system especially for this book to make it easier for Nikon users and collectors to search for information about the world's most extensive photographic system.

Not only are cameras and lenses covered in the Nikon Handbook, but other important system components such as viewfinders, motor drives, macro accessories, filters, flash

The second edition of Nikon Lenses by B. Moose Peterson is now available. Incidentally I should point out a personal involvement as I was approached to do the technical check on this translation from the German original **Das Nikon** Handbuch..

Nikon's impressive range of Coolpix digital cameras is widely acclaimed for their outstanding image quality, unbeatable speed and

versatility and this range is now joined by Nikon Coolpix 990. The 3 million pixel Coolpix 990 is top of the range. It has a dazzling array of creative features offering full manualexposure. This is assisted by the introduction of a 7-blade iris diaphragm and a sophisticated 5-area multi autofocus system similar to that

found on Nikon's professional 35mm single lens reflex cameras. Also featured is a newly designed 3x Zoom-Nikkor lens with focal range of 8-24mm (equivalent to 38-115mm in 35mm). These are combined with a USB interface for fast data transfers and the ability to connect to Nikon's extensive speedlight range. The Coolpix 990 places complete creative photography at your fingertips.

We recommend the Nikon Coolpix 990 Premier bundle which includes the following: 32Mb and 16Mb CompactFlash cards, leather case, LCD (liquid crystal display) monitor sunshade, AC Power adapter, 4 x AA rechargeable NiMh batteries, charge, Photoshop 5.0LE and FotoStation Pro 4.0. Cost inc. Vat is £949.00.

Incidentally the new FotoStation Pro 4.0 software package (worth £89.99) is exclusively bundled free of charge with all Nikon's digital product. FotoStation Pro 4.0 is a professional image storage and archiving piece of software that works like a digital database of images. It allows you to search through thousands of images, write Photoshop compatible text (IPTC), acquire new images from different sources. add text information, enhance your images for inclusion in documents or create web pages containing images automatically and much more besides.

#### The Nikon Legend - Part LVIII By Gray Levett

A few issues ago I wrote an article about the NASA F3 camera and the special dummy version that we had on display for a limited time at the shop. After these articles of mine appear, it is not an uncommon occurrence that they generate a certain amount of correspondence from our readers. These take the form of not only asking further questions but also of providing with more detailed me information. It was this later form that would improve my scant knowledge of this area, as I did not have much information on Nikon's involvement in the NASA space program. A letter appeared from the former head of the PR Division at Kodak Limited, H.J.P. (Douglas) Arnold.

Enclosed with the letter were a number of his articles on

These articles contain a treasure trove of information on this fascinating subject.

Witness the photograph of astronaut Marsha Ivins - surrounded by camera equipment

aboard the shuttle shows how easy it is to handle heavy gear in micro-gravity - finger tip control!"

As I mentioned in my original article Nikon provided a 250exposure back. What I did not know was that it was loaded with 025 millimetres thick film. A dark



in Columbia's aft flight deck during the record-setting 11-day STS-32 mission in January 1990. Marsha Ivins played a prominent part in an experiment conducted to compare a battery of different films and photographic equipment. In all, 16 Kodak and Fuji film types were taken into orbit - including colour negative materials as well as a few blackand-white films.

In her left hand she is holding a Hasselblad fitted with a 70mmfilm back and long lens (focal length unknown) while floating above her right hand is a Nikon F3HP. The rest of the equipment is generally kept in place with the aid of Velcro patches. In Douglas Arnold's letter he points out that "The picture of Marsha Ivins slide permitted removal and installation of the magazine at any time. Fortunately, it is reloadable in flight. The magazine was also equipped with an automatic counter, which keeps record of exposures and stops the camera at zero. Electrical power was provided by an external 12V DC source or by a self contained battery pack (approximately 2000 exposures per pack). On the base is a data annotation module that digitally records days, hours, minutes, seconds, and tenths on each frame of film.

I would like to thank Douglas Arnold for supplying us with these articles together with the NASA photograph reproduced here.

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
